

FUND DESIGNATIONS OF CONTRIBUTIONS

UNRESTRICTED funds account for 43 percent of the revenue received during FY 2011–2012. These funds allow the Community to use them wherever the need is the greatest, including, but not limited to, medical care of the Sisters and maintenance and upkeep of the grounds.

RETIREMENT funds account for 22 percent of funds received. They are used for the current and future care of all the Sisters.

RESTRICTED funds account for 7 percent of the funds received and may be used to support those Sisters who are serving the poor directly or those who are engaged in ministries that do not receive adequate compensation; for example, the *Sister Florine Dannhardt Memorial Endowment Fund* was started by William C. Meier in memory of his fifth-grade teacher Sister Florine. This year, interest from the fund generated \$1,014 for the Providence Heights Alpha School, a sponsored ministry of the Sisters of Divine Providence, and will be used to enhance their music program.

GRANTS account for 1 percent of the funds received, and during this fiscal year, the grants were either for the greatest need or the Sisters' retirement needs.

BEQUESTS are gifts that individuals leave to the Sisters of Divine Providence through their wills or estate plans. Funds received account for 27 percent of revenue received during this fiscal year. By partnering with the Sisters of Divine Providence, these individuals helped create a more compassionate, just, and peaceful world, and helped ensure that the mission of the Sisters continues for future generations. They are members of the Providence Legacy Society.
