One day while in elementary school, our teacher told us to periodically look out a window and just gaze as far as we could see, not looking for or at anything in particular. It was the gazing that was important. That memory came back to me as I read Pope Francis' prayer for the Year of Mercy. The prayer begins:

Lord Jesus Christ, you have taught us to be merciful like the heavenly Father, and have told us that whoever sees you sees Him. Show us your face and we will be saved. Your loving gaze freed Zacchaeus and Matthew from being enslaved by money; ... made Peter weep after his betrayal, and assured Paradise to the repentant thief. ... You are the visible face of the invisible Father, of the God who manifests his power above all by forgiveness and mercy: let the Church be your visible face in the world, its Lord risen and glorified.

Pope Francis embodies this prayer, living out his motto of "Mercifying and Choosing." In his diverse travels, we have witnessed the Holy Father engaging those he encounters with a loving gaze and peaceful smile, speaking of acceptance, understanding and genuine care truly hallmarks of mercy. His words echo his gaze as he speaks gently to those in the grip of poverty and despair, and more forcefully, as he speaks the truth to power—ever the advocate for the voiceless. In the most desperate situations, Pope Francis' selfless example calls forth life for all on his path.
