## CDP Associate Renewal August 22, 2020 – WISDOM FROM JEAN PIERRE DE CAUSSADE

These are not easy times, are they? We like to believe in progress, in a straight path out of an unwanted challenge into a better solution. However, healing paths are never linear. They meander. They flow, like the great rivers of the world, going where the water needs to flow.

Today's scripture is part of a much longer psalm. It is the story of human challenges laid beside God's endless faithfulness. This is THE human story. This is OUR current story. Life can be very hard at the same time as God can be very good. What a beautiful paradox!

A few weeks ago a friend of mine sent me this quote from 18<sup>th</sup> century French Mystic Jean Pierre De Caussade (1675-1751). (Interesting (and providential?) that Sr. Barbara found comfort from the same mystic in the last few days.....)

## "God instructs the heart, not by ideas but by pains and contradictions."

His classic writings in *Abandonment to Divine Providence* express his belief that the present moment is a sacrament from God and that self-abandonment to it and its needs is a holy state......

So where does my meandering perhaps lead us? Over the last few months, our souls have been battered by pandemics, protests over ongoing racial injustice, economic insecurities, environmental crises, loss of loved ones... (to name a few,..)

What shapes our future?

I am convinced that what shapes my future/our future more than anything else is our faith. Its strength, its resilience, our practices (physical and spiritual) and their importance, will all determine how we weather the future.

I fall on these familiar words:

"With radical trust in our Provident God and informed by our, discernment, we the Sisters and Associates of Divine Providence commit to Openness in change Hope in renewal Courage in uncertainty Vibrancy in diminishment Transparency in relationship

Peace and wisdom in troubled times."

As a community, we begin the extraordinary responsibility of discerning what the future holds for community life and it's ministries as the Community prepares for Chapter. This is a new walk and language for me...but not an unfamiliar path for one who's immersed in the "church" and how it functions....

The question I asked myself is what shapes my faith? What will "root" my discernment in the months to come?

Five things came to mind and, honestly, I'm not going to elaborate on them because in many ways, I'm preaching to the choir.....

- Accept change with gratitude
- Cultivate resilience
- Create practices, physical and spiritual, that restore and renew
- Embrace Prayer as Communion with God

And finally, as Sisters and Associates, this is so important for the future and so challenging in times such as these as we are a community together yet apart:

## Strengthen Relationships

Spouses, family, family friends, community and our interactions with the broader worldwide community are important aspects of our walk into the future. In times such as these, strengthening relationships becomes an intentional, deliberate act....we continue to be in chosen or forced isolation. How do we nurture relationships...

You've all been invited to participate in Conversation Circles...

Our Chapter Conversation Circles will include discussion about what we need from each other as we move into the future. It is not just about physical aging, it is about living life together and a vision for ministry in the future. The more we share, the stronger our bonds become and the richer our relationships become.

## What Unseen Things Does God Still Want Us to Accomplish?

Not surprisingly this verse from <u>Hebrews 11:1</u> comes to mind as I think of these things. *Faith shows the reality of what we hope for; it is the evidence of things we cannot see,* None of us know what the future holds but this verse sums it up well

What do we hope for as we look to the future? What are the unseen things God still wants us to accomplish? I wonder. How can we continue to be an advocate for justice and sustainability?

I am, like many of you, appalled by the political and cultural environment in which we live. ...

I believe in a God of love not hate, a God of forgiveness not retribution, of caring and compassion not indifference of peace not war and violence. How do we share God's love for all the people of the world and for the world itself in this kind of an environment?
