






New Faith-Sharing Group in Pittsburgh by Ann Vinski

In October 2018, Local Coordinator Sr. Elena Almendárez initiated a new small faith-sharing group of CDP Sisters and Associates. The group selected the name "Provident Peers." The word "provident" indicates both our affiliation with the Sisters of Divine Providence and our belief that our coming together is a provident event. We see God's providence active in our relationships with each other, and we are supported as we strive to make God's providence visible in the world. "Peers" reflects the value that each person brings to the group. "Peers" is also a play on words, as one of our members has a beautiful service dog named Piers — we love his presence in the group, and we got a chuckle out of the pun!

Provident Peers currently has 13 members and meets on the fourth Sunday of each month. Most members meet for Mass and brunch at Providence Heights, followed by our meeting. We are currently discussing "Living the Questions: Reflection Questions to Guide Discernment on the Evolution of the Associate Way of Life" and have found the topics in the booklet to be very rich.

When asked to describe their experience as part of the Provident Peers group, members used these words: inclusive, connected, and relationship-building; laughter, openness, and friendliness; mutuality, support, and welcoming. One member mentioned that if she had something major going on in her life, she felt she could bring it to the group for support. We look forward to journeying together in faith, as peers in the hands of Providence.

Committee Update



The Associate Finance Committee, which includes Cathy Cassy, Paula Gilchrist, Colleen Higbee, Linda Hoefflin, Erin Middleton, Sr. Stephanie Turck, and me, would like to share with you the tasks for which we have determined this committee is responsible:

1. The Associate Finance Committee will work closely, on budget matters, with Director of Associates and the PLT Associate Liaison, who will in turn, work closely with the department of Mission Advancement and Finance.

2. Develop an annual Associate budget (expenses and income).

<u>Note</u>: Members of the Self-Governance Committee see this as a potentially daunting task. The expense side has been done for years, giving a pretty good handle on that side of the ledger, but we've never had to do an income side before.

It seems like the income side would look like line items for various income streams, maybe, appeals, donations, funding activities, etc. plus a line for "CDP Contributions." (That is the line that we will try to make go to \$0 in near future.) Itemizing this line item makes the Sisters and Associates aware of the cost and also gives the Sisters a number to include in their overall budget planning.

On the expense side, there are province-wide expenses (like running the Associate Director's office) and local expenses (like area Associate renewal receptions, etc.). These expenses will have to be divided up fairly.

3. Develop a funding plan to include a Fundraising Subcommittee.

This subcommittee will design and implement a few events each year. A member of this committee will sit on the Finance Committee to keep members informed of activities and funds raised. 4. Monitor income and expense performance and report to Director of Associates.

This Committee will receive quarterly reports issued from the CDP Finance Office. These will be the major tools for monitoring along with reports from the Fundraising Subcommittee. Feedback should be given to the Director and Provincial Liaison.

REMINDER: As I mentioned in the last newsletter, the Associates Annual Appeal will be going out to everyone through the mail, and members of the committee will be calling sometime in March just to touch base and answer any questions you may have.
